



Impossible Circumstances

In the winter of 1777–1778, George Washington and his army camped at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. The soldiers faced freezing temperatures, starvation, and disease. Many had no shoes, no coats, and little food. Some men wanted to quit; others questioned whether the Revolution could survive. Washington, exhausted himself, visited the camps daily, encouraging his troops and sharing their hardships. He prayed for strength and refused to give up. Through discipline, faith, and determination, he helped the army endure until spring, when new training and supplies arrived. Valley Forge became a powerful symbol of perseverance — proof that courage isn't only found on the battlefield, but also in the will to keep going when hope fades.
